College Overview

MacKillop is a Catholic co-educational secondary College named after Saint Mary of the Cross, co-founder of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart. Inspired by Mary MacKillop, students at the College are encouraged to participate in a spirit of cooperation and to develop a joy of life-long learning. The Catholic ethos of the school underpins curriculum and personal interactions. Each student is supported in their individual journey to achieve their potential to develop personal integrity and independence.

Facilities: The College boasts extensive recreational and sporting grounds, sustained by a recycled irrigation system. The infrastructure is contemporary and accommodates the students in state-of-the-art subject-specific classrooms such as the:

- 400 seat auditorium and inspiring teaching spaces in the Performing Arts Complex
- An exemplary Science wing
- Outstanding Sports Centre including two indoor basketball courts and fully-equipped gymnasium
- Excellent Creative Arts wing

There is an emphasis on digital contemporary learning strategies which are supported by up-to-date and extensive digital infrastructure. This includes a comprehensive wireless /hard wire network in all classrooms throughout the College.

Curriculum: MacKillop College offers students a broad, comprehensive and well-balanced curriculum. Comparatively small class sizes are a distinctive feature that facilitates a productive and engaging learning environment.

From Years 7 – 10, the curriculum establishes and consolidates effective learning and study practices. Electives are offered from all Domains and a strong Language program is a feature. A wide range of Performing Arts subjects, including an outstanding instrumental music program, dance and drama, are provided.

An impressive array of over 40 VCE subjects is offered with alternative pathways through Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) and Vocational Education and Training (VET) certificates are offered.

The College has established a dedicated Year 9 campus at St Mary's Werribee South. The program offered has been designed to foster close links with the local community and to raise awareness of local, national and international citizenship and responsibility. Students are supported in becoming active, self-sufficient and engaged learners.

Sport: MacKillop College has a strong history of success in sport at local, state and national levels. Students can participate in athletics, swimming, cross-country, golf, tennis, netball, basketball, football, softball, volleyball and equestrian just to name a few.

Extra-curricular activities: From Year 7 – 9 all students are involved in a challenging and well-supported Outdoor Education Program designed to develop an awareness of the environment, a personal sense of responsibility, leadership and community spirit in a low impact manner.

Students have the opportunity to partake in musical productions, orchestra, choir, debates, exhibitions and community service.

Student Wellbeing Program: An extensive Pastoral Care Program provides personal development with an emphasis on building quality relationships, leadership, self-esteem, goal-setting and ethical responsibilities within a secure and safe environment.

The Colleges' Individual Needs Program offers a contemporary Gifted and Talented curriculum and support to students who experience learning difficulties.

Principal's Report

Our very name, MacKillop College, holds the DNA of who we are as a Catholic school St Mary of the Cross consciously chose “of the cross” to witness to the core of her own faith: Jesus, the Incarnate Word of God, shows us what humanity could be if we open ourselves fully to the presence and power and love of God, and our neighbour. We celebrated with joy, both in Rome and in Melbourne where Mary was born, the rich depths of Josephite spirituality as Pope Benedict XVI affirmed the heroic life of service Mary lived and proclaimed Mary MacKillop a saint for the universal Church. As we in our day try to follow Jesus in his proclaiming and living the kingdom of a gracious God, we express that faith by making our own the spirituality of St Mary of the Cross.

MacKillop College recognises that our task as educators is to prepare our students to accept their place as men and women in the world. As the issues of the globe become more complex, we must continually monitor our programs to ensure that they are ready to do so. We are blessed to have had stable Leadership Teams which has enabled ideal segues from one period to another, one curriculum framework to the next and sympathetic understandings of the needs of our students and staff. Through and with them, the College has grown in its numbers and infrastructure but with a consistency in approach and effect that has kept the College resilient and strong.

The same winds of change that affect us as a school also influence each student personally. We have always focused on Pastoral Care as the hallmark of a Catholic school, recognising our Christian duty to care for the heart, mind and soul of each individual. However, with the social pressures growing almost exponentially and pervasively, we felt it appropriate to bolster our Pastoral Care with our Student Wellbeing Program. This is a systematic approach across all year levels with a focus on education and information, enabling students to make healthy decisions for their lives to keep them safe. It is supported by committed staff that ensure the integrity and worth of the program and leaders who administer the program by assisting in the professional development of the Homeroom Teachers whose responsibility it is to put it into the classroom practice. Its inclusion in the curriculum indicates the value we place upon the program. More broadly, students are offered the care and assistance from the Homeroom Teacher, counselling services and links to broader community organisations should the need arise. This holistic approach to student wellbeing we hope will provide a model for life beyond their time at MacKillop College and enable them to grow into well-balanced and poised men and women.

The rapid development in technology and science has changed the world, particularly the instant availability of information and knowledge. This manifests as a challenge to all educators who have to question whether traditional teaching strategies and curricula match our educational objectives. The net result is the continual monitoring and adaption of our teaching and learning practices and our curricula. Underpinning this is the understanding that students learn differently, have varying intelligences and that courses need to be developed that shapes and challenges all students. Pathways through secondary school can be linear through the mainstream subjects to VCE. The success of this pathway is indicated by our improving results. The higher ATAR scores enable students simpler access to University and affords them broad opportunities for tertiary education. Our VCAL program offers applied learners choices about their secondary pathways that enable them to utilise their full range of skills and achieve a full secondary education. The program has reached a stage of solidity and reliability that is well recognised as best practice in both the region and the state. It is a full VCAL program and we boast a broad range of VET subjects that enhance the learning of all our students.

We believe that every student has gifts and that it is our responsibility to help them discover and develop those talents. This responsibility is met in our academic program, others through our Wellbeing Program and still more through our extra-curricular program. Here our sports men and women are challenged through well-natured competition. Our artists have access to a full range of options such as art, textiles, instrumental music, dance, singing and drama. There are opportunities for performance individually, in groups and ensembles and in a variety of forums: Liturgies, Eisteddfods, Assemblies and a dedicated

performance program. Our students are accommodated in these pursuits in state-of-the-art facilities such as the Moreno Performing Arts Centre and the access to these performances ensure that the College is often a hub of entertainment for the Wyndham Catholic community.

Our student body has grown significantly over the past 40 years and the celebrations over the past year have brought home just how great that growth has been. At every stage of that development, our students' best interests have been kept at the heart of all decision-making and our Catholic faith has made certain the integrity of these decisions. The campus itself has grown from a two-classroom structure to a campus that houses approximately 1557 students and accommodates all the pursuits that have been discussed earlier.

Each building represents our conviction in the merits of our students and the worth of their interests. Contemporary digitally rich classrooms, dedicated discipline areas such as the Winella Science Block, the Moreno Performing Arts Centre, the Josephite Fine Arts Complex and the John the Baptist Information Resource Centre. The technologies that are shaping the world as we know it are soon to be housed in the new ICT Learning Centre. Here students will have access to significant banks of hardware and software in an open learning environment that provides for all learning styles. Here the students will be able to digitally experiment, play, explore and be challenged to take risks in a safe learning environment. Here the students will learn how to collaborate in teams, work interdependently with partners and individually research personal interests in an online world. The school provides, in all areas access to the fastest Internet bandwidth available allowing for real-time interactions across the globe. This is just a glimpse of what will be happening in the next ten years but our school will always be looking at providing for the "now" while keeping a close eye on the future. We are also aware that these are the technologies of future and, as it is with all we do, we must also prepare our students to participate in that future with discerning judgement that allows our sons and daughters control over their lives as well as being proactive digital citizens.

There is, for some, great fear in the world about the future; some of those fears are groundless while others are deserving of our attention. As an educational institution our task is clear: prepare our students for the world in which they will be citizens and leaders. This means challenging fear and accepting the opportunities that change brings – some of which is rapid, some of which is incipient and some yet to be imagined. As a College we accept the need for constant change, growth and development in our students, staff, leadership and administration: we try to model what we expect. There is, however, the one true constant in this changing world – our Catholic Faith. If we keep fast to those values that Jesus lived and for which he died and whose footsteps our founding Mother, St Mary of the Cross, walked, we can rest easy that we are doing everything possible in the best interest of every student at MacKillop College.

Education in Faith

The health of our community can be measured by the way we are with each other, by the way we love one another as God loves us. Jesuit theologian, B. Lonergan, wrote the following: “God made us in God's image, for our authenticity consists in being like God, in self-transcending, in being origins of value, in true love.” There are within our community many who are clearly origins of good, of true value, people who remind us daily of our call from God to become reflections of God's grace for each other. This, we believe, is the mark of a true Catholic community, and Mary MacKillop would be very happy with the efforts of so many to embody the Gospel.

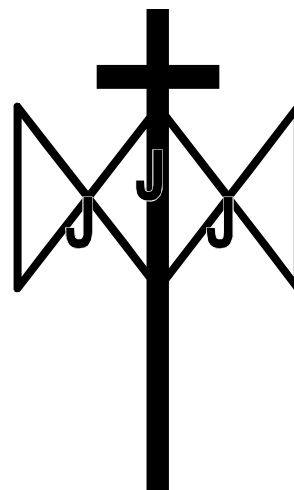

From the aforementioned data one would think that MacKillop College is marginally progressing in its efforts to enable all of its students to be above the minimum standards (ie six categories show improvement). The drop in benchmarks set in 2009 make improvement more possible and it must be noted that it is a different cohort of students from one Year 7 and/or 9 to the next. The most accurate comparison should be drawn from the Year 7s in 2008 to the Year 9s in 2010 because they are the same cohort. Doing this, the results indicate that the students high standards set in Literacy and Numeracy are not being maintained (ie -2.8% Reading, -6.2% Writing, Numeracy -4.2%).

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) continues in 2010 with MacKillop College students in Year 7 and Year 9 being assessed using common national tests in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy. The data from the NAPLAN tests gives MacKillop the ability to compare our students’ achievements against national standards and to monitor their progress over time.

Students at MacKillop generally meet the standards expected of them in all categories of the NAPLAN with results relatively similar to statewide expectations.

All teachers are encouraged to partake in College funded Professional Learning activities. Throughout the duration of 2010, staff were exposed to a diverse range of Professional Learning opportunities. In one such internal opportunity, teachers could elect to be involved in 'ICT Education Research and Development'. These were organised regularly (24 per year) of which Teaching and Learning, ICT and eLearning are the major foci.</p> <p>Staff are required to attend "Professional Learning Modules" which are organised four times throughout the year. Activities included: A focus on Literacy and Numeracy – a whole school approach, NAPLAN and PAT Testing, Depression and its links with student learning, Acceleration for students, Principles and Key Strategies for the College. Externally, approximately 645 staff engaged in Professional Learning Activities. The type of Professional Learning is diverse and includes such activities as: Adobe Dreamweaver CS4, iTouch>uTouch: IWBs for Learning and Teaching, Creating a School where Boys will Strive, Flat Water Canoe Instructor (Level 1). 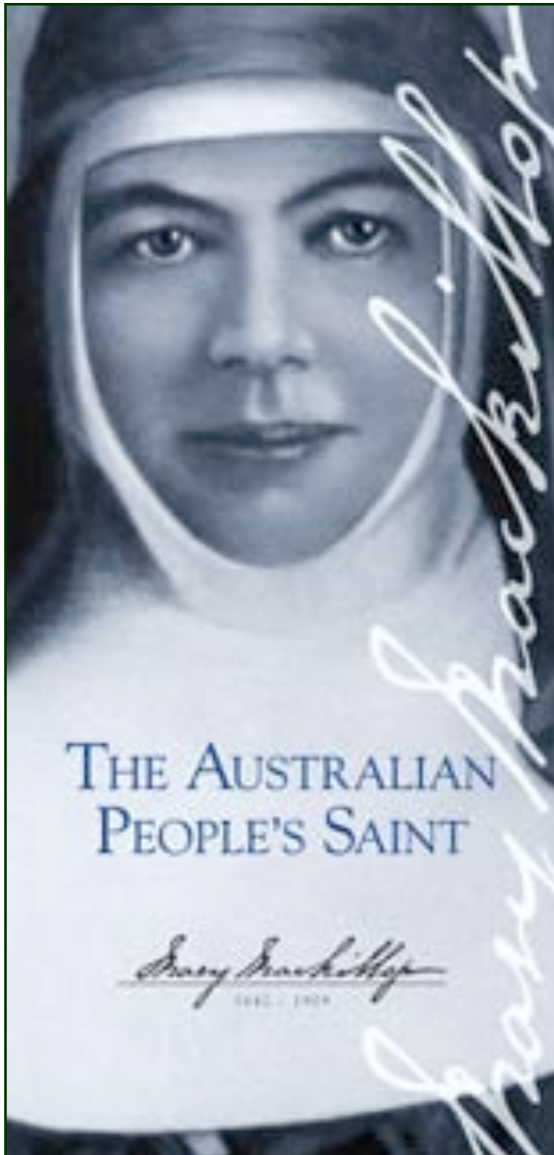
